## 'The Need for Men in Mentoring'

Our community is facing a great need: the need for men to stand up as role models for the men of the next generation. Our society is preserved every time one person passes on skills, morals, and values to someone younger. Indeed, what a boy understands about being a man comes largely from those that they see in their day-to-day lives. Today, many boys in our area are lacking this important connection. Some organizations and clubs are battling this problem by getting local youth connected in ongoing, structured relationships aimed at developing their competence and potential. The people dedicating themselves in this way are called mentors.

When youth are connected to someone older who cares about them, they gain more than a friend. A mentor can serve as a listening ear, one they may not otherwise have. They can give valuable direction, helping youth to see doors opening in their futures. There are also benefits to being a mentor, such as building interpersonal skills and expanding one's own horizons. Many mentors have reported that they gain more from the experience than the young person does.

A person desiring to get involved with a mentoring program must possess two things: desire and time. Building a strong relationship with a young person is a slow process. Many times, the youth has not learned how trust someone. The mentor's desire and commitment will ultimately make the difference in a match's relationship.

Most mentoring programs ask that matches spend an average of an hour a week together. The mentor's accountability and consistency is more important than the amount of time. Most people have been involved, in one way or another, in natural mentoring. This happens whenever one person reaches out to another, and a development-focused relationship begins. These happen in many settings, from the workplace to the playground. Research shows that this type of mentoring most often occurs between people who have a lot in common.

In a formal, facilitated mentoring program, an organization matches mentors with mentees. They recruit, train, and match people, and then monitor the progress of the mentoring connection. They also provide support and are available to assist the mentor with each step of the relationship.

There are several ways to get involved in mentoring through 4-H in Mackinac County. The Robert H. Nitz Mentoring Program connects youth with caring men and women. Mentors in this program must be at least 21 years old. Teenagers are also able to become involved through the Mackinac County 4-H Peer Mentoring Program. This program accepts male and female mentors from ages 12 to 19 and is active in Cedarville, Engadine, and St. Ignace.

Local physicians volunteer to see these patients during regular office hours. The program helps arrange doctor appointments, laboratory tests, X-rays, and other medical services. If medications are needed, Ms. Morningstar will help patients fill out the forms to request free prescriptions from pharmaceutical companies, or to join a co-pay program in which the patient pays \$5 for a prescription, if that medicine is not available as a donation. In those cases, the coalition pays the rest of the drug's cost. Patients are also encouraged to use Wal-Mart's \$4 prescription program whenever possible, Ms. Osborn said.

The costs of the program are federally funded through indigent care agreements with local hospitals, as well as a series of small grants and the United Way. All workers except Ms. Osborn are part time, and volunteer efforts and donations from health care providers are critical to the program's success, Ms. Osborn said.

The coalition began enrolling Mackinac County residents in 2005, a year after it began serving people in Chippewa County, and the same year it opened in Luce County.

Ms. Osborn wants to find volunteers who can help patients
